Long-time member, **Steve Roberts** of Cheyenne, died May 5 at the age of 75. Steve was born in Lusk and graduated from Cody High School in 1965. He attended Northwest College in Powell, and the University of Wyoming, then served two years in the Army. He was honorably discharged with the rank of sergeant in 1971. Later he returned to UW to receive a teaching degree and taught school at Goshen Hole High School and at Moorcroft High School. Later he earned a Master's degree in education from the University of Arizona in Tucson. Steve worked for the US Postal Service and, after a long career, retired and lived his remaining years in Cheyenne.

Along with his two brothers, Phil and Dave, he co-authored the popular *Wyoming Almanac*, now in its 7th edition. Steve enjoyed serving his community and was a member of the Cowboy Joe Club, the Wyoming Mayflower Society and others. Our sincere condolences go out to his family.
