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Record Number of Nominations Received for WSHS Awards Program

Awards program chair, Judy Musgrave, reports that 115 nominations were received for the 2010 program year. "For the previous two program years only sixty-nine nominations were received," she said. "This is the most nominations received since 2005 when I first joined the committee, and represents an increase of 67% over last year."

According to Judy nominations came in from eighteen affiliated chapters—up from twelve last year—and eleven individual WSHS members—up from four last year. Nine of the chapters submitted five or more nominations, while Weston and Sheridan County chapters submitted fifteen each, and Star Valley sixteen. "I wholeheartedly congratulate the chapter award chairmen and individuals who took the time to find worthy projects and write nominations for them," says Judy. The Awards Committee, in addition to Judy Musgrave, includes Cindy Brown, Cheyenne; Lynne Houze, Cody and Linda Fleming, Baggs.

Award winners receive two complimentary tickets to the awards luncheon which will be in Evanston on September 10th. There they will receive a certificate, a plaque or an Honorable Mention. Previous award winners in the Publications Category have said that this recognition from the Society really does help sell more books!

From the President. . .



Dear Friends ---
A highlight of my month was to attend the Heart Mountain Wyoming Foundation's opening of the Interpretive Learning Center on August 20. It was an amazing weekend filled with wonderful events. More than two hundred former internees and their families attended. Friday evening about seven hundred attended the Pilgrimage dinner enjoying a wonderful talk by Tom Brokaw. The official dedication ceremony took place Saturday with more than twelve hundred people attending. Senator Daniel Inouye of Hawaii was the keynote speaker, along with former Senator Alan Simpson and former member of the U.S. House of Representative and Cabinet Secretary Norm Mineta.

Three Heart Mountain Goodwill Ambassadors, former internees Tak Hoshizaki, and LaDonna Zall, the curator and archivist for the Foundation, cut the wire (instead of a ribbon) opening the Interpretive Learning Center. Afterwards people were allowed to enter the ILC and view the exhibits documenting the life of the internees. The ILC's introductory film, *All We Could Carry*, produced and directed by Academy Award winning documentarian Steven Okazaki was also shown. Mr. Okazaki's father was interned at Heart Mountain.

The Foundation hosted a banquet attended by approximately eight hundred people. One highlight was a panel discussion examining the internment experience from various perspectives. Panelists included Judge Lance Ito, a Los Angeles County Superior Court Judge (his parents first met at Heart Mountain); Secretary Norm Mineta; Dr. Melba Vasquez, president of the American Psychological Association, and Irene Hirano Inouye president of the U.S.-Japan Council.

The dedication of the ILC received great press. The *Wall Street Journal* carried a story on Saturday, and on Sunday the *Casper-Star-Tribune* carried a front page story, and the events also were covered extensively by the *Billings Gazette*. Wyoming Public Radio broadcast stories before and after the dedication and on Friday, August 26, "On Point," a program created by Boston's Public Radio Station and broadcast on NPR devoted an entire hour to the story of the Heart Mountain Relocation Center. Shirley Higuichi, president of the Foundation, Eric Muller, a member of the Foundation and one of the co-chairs of the Program Committee which created the ILC exhibit, and Toshi Ito, a former internee and mother of Judge Lance Ito, were guests on the show.

As a Foundation board member, I played a small role in the creation of the exhibits and take great pride in what the Foundation has accomplished. I encourage all of you to visit the ILC and learn about the internee experience at the camp.


The Weston County Historical Society recently celebrated the grand opening of the Weston County Fair Event Center. WSHS past president Mike Jording pre-

the act of converging and especially moving toward union or uniformity

The Wyoming Department of State Parks & Cultural Resources, in cooperation with a host of other agencies and organizations, will conduct the first ever Convergence Conference: Culture, Creativity, Community. The conference will be held at the Holiday Inn in Cody, October 6-8 (Thursday-Saturday).

The conference is designed to bring together Wyoming's creative, cultural and historical resource groups to take an introspective look at the state's cultural heritage. The goal is to increase cooperative planning across communities, and to unite under common goals. According to conference planners interactive sessions and cultural tours will allow participants to share resources, learn from cultural projects, and generate partnerships that will increase cultural outreach efforts statewide. Anyone interested in the arts, humanities, libraries, history, historic preservation, and education are encouraged to participate. Discussions will focus on how to identify what topics mean and to find out what Wyoming is doing about them. The outcome will help all these diverse groups work together to make Wyoming successful.

Among the topics identified so far include What is Cultural Heritage tourism? What is the Creative Economy? What are Best Practices in Advocacy in Wyoming? What is the Status of Culture in Wyoming? What does the Creative Vitality Index Mean? What does it take to implement these ideas? What resources are available?

Speakers and panelists will address these topics and will highlight case studies from programs within the state that are cur-

rently successful in Wyoming communities.

Cultural tours throughout the conference will include the Buffalo Bill Historical Center, the Historic Irma Hotel and Buffalo Bill Dam, and the Heart Mountain Interpretive Learning Center.

Additional sponsors include Wyoming Libraries, Wyoming Main Street, Wyoming Humanities Council, the University of Wyoming, the Buffalo Bill Historical Center and Warehouse Twenty One (a Wyoming marketing firm). The Wyoming State Historical Society is also participating in the conference, and president Rick Ewig encourages chapters to send a representative. He said, "This will be a unique opportunity for the Society's chapters to not only share their successes, but to also learn what others are doing to stay successful."

WIDE VARIETY OF PROJECTS RECEIVE RESEARCH GRANTS

The Wyoming State Historical Society announces recipients of its 2011 Lola Homsher research grants. The committee selected eight applicants who will receive a total of \$12,000 for their individual research projects. Chairman Mary Kelley said the Homsher Grant program is one of the most important ways the Society reaches out to the public and makes an impact on preserving Wyoming's wonderful history. Anyone doing research about Wyoming that will result in a tangible project is eligible to apply for the research grants. Kelley said this applies to members and non-members alike, amateur and professional historians, and students. For details visit www.wyshs.org. This year's Homsher recipients are:

- **Ellen Sue Blakey of Thermopolis** received \$1,000 for her project titled "Forgotten Stories: Outlaws & Bootleggers of the Wind Rivers and Absarokas."
- **Mike Mackey of Sheridan** received \$1200 for his project that will result in a book titled "Henry Coffeen: A Political Life."
- **John W. Shields of Cheyenne** received \$500 for his project that will describe the genesis of the foundation elements of Wyoming's water law as developed by Elwood Mead.
- **Robert Legoski of Sheridan** received \$1700 for a book project titled "Absaraka Park Revisited."
- **Sue Castaneda of Cheyenne, and the Wyoming State Archives** received \$2,000 that will assist in producing a coffee table style book about the historic Hitching Post Inn.
- **The Jackson Hole Historical Society & Museum in Jackson** received \$2500 to assist in producing an hour-long documentary titled "The Coach: An American Crossroads."
- **Laura Lee Scheiber of Bloomington, Indiana** received \$1100 that will assist her in completing research for her project titled "Conceiving the Wilderness: Image, Place and Ritual in the Rocky Mountain West."
- **Kristin Raesi and the Northern Arapaho Tribe** received \$2,000 that will result in research and oral histories of past Native Americans who served in the Armed Forces during WWII and the Korean War.

In addition to receiving research funds, each recipient receives a one-year complimentary membership in the Wyoming State Historical Society. Benefits include receiving the Society's scholarly journal, *Annals of Wyoming*, and the monthly newsletter, *Wyoming History News*. The Lola Homsher Grant is made possible from the endowment that prominent Wyoming historian Lola Homsher created for the purpose of promoting the research of Wyoming history. The next deadline to apply for these research grants is February 28, 2012. Thomas Kennet-Were, an English gentleman and artist, traveled across the United States in 1868 and 1869. He documented his trip by writing "Nine Months in the United States," and by painting many scenes in watercolor. He crossed Wyoming along the not yet completed Union Pacific Railroad line and, in March 1869, a snowstorm west of Laramie delayed the train for twenty-six hours. From this experience Kennet-Were painted "Snowed up in the Rocky Mountains." His painting is depicted on the cover of the 2012 Calendar of Wyoming History in splendid color which can not be fully appreciated here.
