

A WORD FROM THE PRESIDENT



Hello Friends, It is great to look out my window and see all the flowering

trees and bushes. It does not last long, so I am trying to savor the view. I also have a rhubarb bush in my back yard which is going to town. I have never eaten rhubarb. It should be interesting.

The Executive Committee has been doing more work on the Bylaws revision project and is planning to approve proposed revisions for publication in the July newsletter. There was a special meeting held in May. Those attending focused on two main revisions. This includes a proposal to change the Bylaws amendment approval process from Chapter representatives voting at the Annual Meeting to a general membership vote, similar to how the membership votes for the Executive Committee. It would allow any needed bylaw revisions to be voted on at any point during the year. The Society would retain the publishing requirement. Any proposed amendments

must be published in the newsletter not less than thirty (30) days before the voting deadline.

I had suggested the above change because I wanted the Society to offer a monthly membership / subscription of possibly \$7 per month. It would make paying the Society dues more flexible, by allowing members to have a choice between the regularly scheduled monthly payment or continuing to pay once a year. I was dismayed to discover that this small change could not be approved until the Annual Meeting, which at the time was ten (10) months away.

It has not been finalized yet, but there may be a second suggested revision addressing a possible dues increase. Aley was able to figure out a way to increase the dues, provide a senior citizen discount and a digital membership option. Both of those approaches address concerns about any dues increase impacting our valuable older members who may be on a fixed income. More details will be forthcoming. The Committee Executive will continue the discussion at a June 23rd meeting in Thermopolis, the Sunday at the end of the Trek, with online attendance available. For additional details, please contact Aley.

The Historical Society will be hosting a booth at this year's Civic Season event in Chevenne on the afternoon of June 16th. Thank you to Kylie McCormick and Mary Cox for helping out. There are a couple other upcoming volunteer opportunities. The Historical Society will have a booth at the Wyoming State Fair in August. EDITORIAL

"I get chills when I think about this." Senator Cale Case, R, of Lander has been a long-time proponent of giving Lander's only Governor his due. Last year, Case introduced a bill to recognize Hunt as a "consummate model to public servants for his distinguished career, his commendable civility and courage and his service" to the state and nation."

Hunt lost his life to suicide seventy years ago this month to what many believe to be victim of dirty politics of the time.

A popular politician, Hunt won six elections in his lifetime - once the legislature, twice as Secretary of State, twice as Governor of Wyoming, and finally to the US Senate in 1948.

Hunt started his Senatorial career just as McCarthyism was getting its teeth. By 1954, the country was divided with extreme viewpoints on either end and the balance of power up for grabs in the 1954 election. The Senate was evenly split: if Hunt, a moderate Democrat, would resign, then a replacement by Wyoming's Republican Governor would give the Republicans a 49-47 majority.

June 1954 hosted some of the most defining moments of McCarthyism. On June 9th, the infamous "have you no decency sir?" moment of army trials was televised across the United States.

On June 18th, Joseph R. McCarthy announced he had dirt on a US Senator. McCarthy and his camp said it was a Senator who was blackmailing someone; but it was opposite as Senator Hunt was being blackmailed after his son had been

arrested. Facing non-stop pressure from the hostile environment that was Washington in 1954, Hunt took his own life on June 19th.

US Senator Lester Hunt, Wyoming's WWII war-time governor, accomplished and well-liked within his own state, was a man who tried to do his best for his beloved state. Through his story, we can see the pitfalls of polarizing attitudes combined with an unwillingness to, at the bare minimum, hear out the other side.

Decades later, former Wyoming Senator Alan Simpson said that what happened to Hunt "passed all boundaries of decency and exposed an evil side of politics."
