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WHS CELEBRATES 70 YEARS

The Wyoming Historical Society officially celebrated its 70th year on October 18th.

Mr. Marble, who was elected Chairman at the 1953 initial meeting, opened with a short address of welcome. He then introduced Mr. F. H. Sinclair of Sheridan who spoke briefly on the needs and purposes of a state historical society.

This first meeting was devoted almost exclusively to the discussion and adoption of a constitution and bylaws for the new society. A mimeographed copy of a sample draft was presented to each person in attendance. A thorough study of the suggestions was made and spirited discussions took place during the four-hour meeting, with successful results.

FROM THE PRESIDENT

Hello Friends,

Fall is definitely upon us. I hope you are enjoying the colors and the cool crisp weather. With the Society's fiscal year concluding at the end of September, the Executive Committee met on October 21 in Douglas and online to review the Society's revenue and expenses and to vote on a proposed 2023-2024 budget. A copy of the budget is included in the newsletter for the membership to review. As you review the budget, note a few additional details that I have shared in this column.

Due to several planned and unplanned expenses, such as insurance, membership database, increase of the director's salary and benefit package, and rent, the budget is in the red this year, as projected. However, a strategy is in place to cover the deficit for up to three years. Additionally, Executive Director Aley marketing Philp's plans and membership drives initiative will supplement the budget over time.

The Society's membership database may become unusable in as little as a couple of months due to technological issues. As a result, the Executive Committee included funding to support an online membership system. It has the capabilities of the old svstem with additional functionality that enables members to join the Society and pay dues online in addition to our traditional methods. The system will also include tools to help with marketing, planning, and

The Executive Committee discussed committee structure recommendation. At the meeting in October, Aley presented a proposed restructuring. Aley will continue refining this new restructuring and collaborate with the Bylaws Committee to draft revised bylaws that will be presented to the Executive Committee at its next meeting on January 13th. Since it will be in the middle of winter, this public meeting will be held via Zoom. Thanks for all your patience as we work through the transition in staff. I am happy to have Aley onboard, and she is eager to get to know you, and the Chapters, and see how the Wyoming Historical Society can provide additional help and support.

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Need financial aid to help complete your history project? Did you know that the WHS offers cash grants to people involved in research activities based on various aspects of the state's history?

The grants, ranging from \$100.00 up to \$1500.00 are awarded yearly each Spring. The Lola Homsher Grant Program, the Lola Homsher History Day Scholarship, the Henryetta Berry Memorial Award and the

Judge and Mrs. Percy W. Metz Memorial Award are made possible through an endowment to the Wyoming Historical Society made by Lola Homsher before her death in 1986.

Miss Homsher, originally from Basin, Wyoming was a well-known historian and author. Lola Homsher was the first practicing Archivist for the Wyoming State Archives. During her tenure she wrote many articles for the newspapers in her own column called "From the Archives." She also wrote items for presentation on radio and for various historical entities.

She was the director of what is now the Cultural Resources Division of State Parks and Cultural Resources from 1951 to 1965. In this capacity she served as Editor of the <u>Annals of Wyoming</u> and was instrumental in the founding of the Wyoming Historical Society.

Miss Homsher and her associate, Henryetta Berry, were prime movers in establishing records management and document preservation programs in Wyoming. She was always interested in educating the young people of the state and enjoyed a long and fruitful career in the history profession in Wyoming.

In 1961 the Western Writers of America awarded Miss Homsher the Best Nonfiction Spur Award for the book, <u>SOUTH PASS</u>, 1868: James Chisolm's Journal of the Wyoming Gold Rush. The Spur Awards, given annually for distinguished writing about the American West, are among the oldest and most prestigious in American literature.

In 1869 the new territory of Wyoming became the first in the nation to recognize women's citizenship rights, including the right to vote, hold office, own property, parental rights, and even equal pay for teachers. Governor John A. Campbell signed the bill recognizing women's right to vote into law on December 10th, 1869, celebrated now as Wyoming Day. Yet, we must remember that we wouldn't be able to celebrate today, if it weren't for the men and women who stood up for suffrage again

two years later.

In 1871, Ben Sheeks—the main opponent to the suffrage law in 1869—served as the Speaker of the House. During the 1872 session, Rep. C.E. Castle from Uinta County introduced a bill to repeal woman suffrage that passed in the house with nine votes to three, and one absentee. One newspaper claimed that Rep. M.C. Brown's powerful speech on behalf of woman suffrage even convinced his opponents who, regardless of principle, still voted in favor of the repeal. Brown went on to serve as President of Wyoming's Constitutional Convention and helped to draft world's first written constitution to explicitly protect the civil and political rights of all citizens regardless of race or sex.

Before the Council's committee considering the repeal could bring the measure back to the Council for a vote, Governor Campbell issued his veto. In his defense of suffrage Campbell wrote that the repeal said "too much if she is, as no one will deny, the equal of man in heart and mind, for in that case we cannot afford to dispense with

her counsel and assistance in the government of the territory."

The Council Journal also records a petition from Eliza Stewart Boyd with 29 signatures asking the Legislature to maintain suffrage. The year before Boyd served on the nation's first mixed jury. While still reviewing the bill, Councilman Stephen Downey spoke for an hour on the


floor, "to a large number of spectators, among whom were a number of ladies." Downey's vote along with three others would uphold the governor's veto and preserve woman suffrage. The men and women who defended woman suffrage in 1872 helped to establish equality as a foundational ideal in Wyoming's identity.

In Memoriam



V.J. (Velma Jean) Reckling Bales, a journalist at the Laramie Daily Boomerang for nearly 40 years, died July 6, 2023 surrounded by her family. She was 95.

V.J. was born in Quinter, Kansas on September 10, 1927 to Dr. Walter E. and Daisy Jean Reckling. She moved to Lusk, Wyoming, with her family when she was four years old and graduated Lusk High School. She attended Colorado Women's College and the University of Wyoming where, in 1949, she graduated with a B.A. in journalism and history.

V.J. was devoted to journalism and enjoyed a groundbreaking career at several Wyoming newspapers. She worked for the Cheyenne Tribune as a reporter in the mid-1950s as one of the

few women on staff. In 1960 the family moved to Laramie, where V.J. worked at the Boomerang in a variety of positions for the next 40 years. In 1999, she retired from there after serving as the Lifestyle Editor for 20 years.

An avid reader, V.J. loved historical research, particularly when it was focused on her beloved Wyoming. She used her research as background for numerous award-winning stories and poems. V.J. also loved animals and believed every animal deserves a home; numerous rescue animals were always part of her family.

THE JOURNEY TO 250



On July 4, 2026, our nation will commemorate the 250th anniversary of the founding of the United States. The journey toward this historic milestone is an opportunity to pause and reflect on our nation's past, honor the contributions of all Americans, and look ahead toward the future we want to create for the next generation and beyond.

Governor Mark Gordon has announced the members of the Wyoming Semiquincentennial Planning Task Force. Created by Executive Order, the task force will make recommendations on the planning of projects, events and activities to commemorate the 250th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence and the founding of the United States.

"I want to thank all those who expressed an interest in the planning to commemorate this important anniversary," Governor Gordon said.

"Wyoming is a patriotic state. This celebration is certain to reflect our enthusiasm for the fundamental values our country was founded on."

The Task Force will prepare propo-

sals for projects, events and activities that will occur as part of the celebration in 2026. There will be opportunities for the public to engage with the task force and provide suggestions as they develop their recommendations. Executive Order does not authorize the Task Force to expend or obligate funds, unless those funds are specifically appropriated by the Legislature in a future session.
