Prisoner of War (POW) camp is extensively documented, notably in Cheryl O'Brien's book. World War II POW Camps of Wyoming. O'Brien's delves work into the experiences of the Italian and German prisoners held across Wyoming's nineteen POW camps, highlighting the unique relationships that developed between the prisoners, U.S. military personnel, and local residents. These camps played a vital, yet often overlooked, role in the state's wartime POW labor efforts. with local contributing to agricultural timber and industries.

Friday's itinerary packed with historical gems. The group explored Fort Fetterman, a vital military outpost during the Indian Wars, and then journeyed to the somber Casper Kid WWII B17 Crash Site. powerful a reminder of wartime sacrifices. The charming town of Glenrock welcomed the trekkers. showcasing its

historic bridge and park, symbols of the community's enduring spirit. A highlight of the day was a fascinating presentation by Con Trumbull on the devastating passenger railway train wreck that occurred just outside Glenrock in 1923, bringing a forgotten piece of local history to life. The day concluded with a picturesque dinner hosted at the Ayres Monument State Historic Site, offering stunning views and a chance to reflect on the monument's rich history as a natural bridge and a landmark for travelers for centuries. Before dinner. attendees explored Carevhurst site and the Bixby Ranch, learning about their significant contributions to the region's ranching heritage.

The tragic 1923 train disaster, often referred to as the Cole Creek Train Wreck, was a significant event in Wyoming's



history. Con Trumbull's book, Steam, Steel, and Silence: The Story of the Cole Creek Train Wreck, provides a comprehensive account of this devastating incident. On a stormv September night, Burlington train No. 30, en route from Casper to Denver, plunged into Cole Creek after a washed-out bridge gave way, resulting in Wyoming's worst passenger rail disaster. Trumbull's research brings to light the human stories and difficult circumstances surrounding the which wreck. claimed numerous lives and left a lasting impact on the local communities.

Saturday was equally engaging, beginning with a visit to the intriguing town of Lost Springs, where attendees learned about James Edwards, an African-American early homesteader who arrived in the region in the late 19th century,

The "Rock in the Glen," located on the western edge of Glenrock, Wyoming, is a historic sandstone outcrop etched with the names and dates of 19th-century emigrants who traveled the Oregon Trail. This natural landmark served as a notable campsite and waypoint for thousands journeying westward, including John C. Frémont's 1842 expedition guided by Kit Carson. The surrounding area, once home to Deer Creek Station, played a vital role as a Pony Express stop and telegraph relay point during the mid-1800s. Today, visitors can explore the site and still find faint carvings left by pioneers, offering a tangible connection to Wyoming's frontier past.

enduring the harsh conditions of the Wyoming frontier to establish his home and livelihood with his highly accomplished wife. A scenic drive through Wyoming's varied landscapes led to their Homestead on the way to Lance Creek.

James Edwards (1871-1951) was a remarkable African American homesteader whose perseverance shaped a successful life in Wyoming. Born in Ohio, Edwards moved west in 1900 and eventually found work on the Running Water Ranch near Lusk, where

he rose to the position of foreman. In 1914, he married Lethel Dawson, and together they established a thriving ranch in the Harney Creek area. Their homestead was notable for its early adoption of modern amenities, and they actively encouraged other African Americans to settle in the Lusk region. Edwards' story of resilience and success, which was even featured in a 1949 Ebony Magazine article, serves as a testament to the contributions of early homesteaders in Wyoming.

The morning also featured a

captivating presentation on the oil and gas history in Lance highlighting Creek. the industry's profound impact on the area, followed by exclusive look the impressive Miller Museum. Lunch was provided by the 3 Sisters in Manville, providing a delicious break at this historic and well known stop. The afternoon was dedicated to the ongoing quest to restore the of the Shawnee center community, their schoolhouse, which miraculously still retains its original bell, a beacon of its

past. The day concluded with a presentation and tour of the Shaw - Gray Ranch south of Orin Junction. The Gray Ranch, with its deep roots in Wyoming's ranching history, has been a prominent fixture in the landscape for generations, contributing significantly to the state's agricultural heritage.

An expert on the Sand Creek Massacre, Ridgely is




Zane Fross is a lifelong Wyoming resident with deep roots in the state, having dedicated 26 years as a ranch hand and 22 years as a contractor.

The Wyoming Historical Society Executive Board is also pleased to share the voting results of the recently proposed Bylaw changes. A total of 589 members, out of our 1,364 members, participated in the Bylaws vote. This unprecedented 43% voting member participation demonstrates the commitment of our members to the democratic process and the Wyoming Historical Society. We appreciate everyone's involvement and continued support.

One of the main reasons for the change in the Bylaws last September was to give all members a chance to vote on the Bylaws and the future of the Society, rather than limiting it to the approximately 30 members who were able to attend the Annual Meeting each year. The Executive Board of the Wyoming Historical Society, in accordance with Article V, Section I, No. 2 of the September 2024 WHS Bylaws, certifies to all members that this vote, conducted anonymously as promised to all members, was valid, accurate, and legitimate. This ensures a fair and democratic process accessible to all current members of the Society.

Overall, the changes to the Bylaws passed by at least 70% on all accounts. We are enthusiastic *continued on page 12*

about embarking on a path that will ensure the longevity of the Society for future generations. We recognize that change can be challenging and, at times, difficult to embrace. However, it is a crucial step to secure a sustainable future for the Wyoming Historical Society.

We, the Executive Board, are committed to listening to and engaging with all stakeholders of Wyoming History and our members. Your voices are invaluable in shaping the future of our Society, and we encourage you to continue sharing your thoughts and ideas with us. Together, we can build a stronger, more vibrant community that honors and preserves our rich history for generations to come.

Following the recent updates to our Bylaws, which are available on our website, we have formally removed the designation of chapters from our organizational structure. This means that while individuals formerly affiliated with county chapters remain valued members of our Society, with all of the same member benefits and privileges as before, the chapters themselves will no longer be under WHS oversight.

All current memberships will be honored until the start of the new fiscal year, October 1, 2025; at which point all memberships will reset. Any donor who donates \$25 or more is a member and will receive the publications digitally; any donation of \$50 or more will also receive a physical copy of the publications.

This shift reflects a larger vision—one that ensures local historical groups can operate with greater autonomy, flexibility, and local control over their missions and management. Each organization will now have the opportunity to establish itself as an independent nonprofit entity, shaping its own future while continuing to preserve and share Wyoming's history in ways that best serve their communities.

While the Wyoming Historical Society will no longer provide administrative oversight for our former chapters, we remain deeply committed to supporting all Wyoming historical organizations across the entire state through programming, educational resources, and marketing assistance. Our future relationships with local historical societies—many of which were formerly known as chapters—will be those of affiliates, rather than overseers. This new structure will allow us to expand our mission statewide, offering assistance not only to these groups but to historical institutions, such as small museums across Wyoming, who are in desperate need of additional support right now.

We truly believe that local control is the best path forward, allowing historical societies to tailor their operations to the needs of their communities while still benefiting from WHS's expertise and support. This is an opportunity for growth, not retreat—an opportunity to ensure Wyoming's rich history continues to be preserved and celebrated without bureaucratic constraints limiting its reach.

Change can be daunting, but it also offers exciting new possibilities. We ask for your continued trust and support as we take this step together, ensuring that Wyoming's history remains vibrant, accessible, and deeply rooted in the communities that cherish it.

We are greatly looking forward to continuing to move in a direction that will preserve the longevity of the Society for generations to come, making our mission and vision more accessible and increasing public awareness in the coming months and years.

We again thank you for your continued support of the Society and ask that you stick with us during these transitions for a better future, ensuring we can continue to share Wyoming's history with this and many generations to come.
