

She researched and verified dates the artifacts were used and personally contacted families who might have information about the artifacts. Ruth divided the artifacts into two inventories: those prior to 1900 were classified as Daughters of the Utah Pioneers artifacts and those after 1900 were classified as Star Valley Historical Society artifacts. The items are displayed together, but the inventories are kept separately.

Craig Ellis, Fourth Grade Teacher at Highland Park Elementary School in Sheridan

Each year Craig spends considerable time getting kids excited about Wyoming History. Students write to each of the counties in Wyoming requesting information. This information is then compiled into a Wyoming Notebook from which they research information about the history and culture of the regions. Using this notebook and other sources, students work in teams to plan a "Wyoming Vacation. Their trip must include historical and cultural sites. Students share this vacation with their classmates and parent guests at a reception.

In the spring and fall, Craig takes his students on field trips to the places in Wyoming they have learned about. Places such as Yellowstone Park, the Medicine Wheel, Ayers Rock Natural Bridge, Register Cliff, Oregon Trail Ruts, Independence Rock, Ames Monument, Fort Laramie, Devil's Tower, Vore Buffalo Jump, Sundance Museum, etc. In past years, he has also organized trips to the

Buffalo Bill Historical Center in Cody, the Wyoming Territorial Prison, and the Lincoln Monument.

Students leave Craig's class with a solid knowledge of the state in which they live and excited about sharing that knowledge with others.
